Topic: Ordinance or Resolution

History:

The codified ordinance has not been updated since 1971. We have seen a decline over the years of qualified applicants for police. The civil service commission and the police department are looking to adopt changes in the civil service rules and regulations to allow for lateral entries at the police department. This will allow for officers with full time experience and who have not yet reached forty-two (42) years of age. This legislation change is needed to so Painesville City Ordinance and Civil Service Rules and Regulations are consistent. The Painesville Civil Service Rules and Regulations are expected to be approved at an emergency meeting once this legislation is amended.

Financing:

There are no cost associated with this legislation change.

Recommendation:

The legislation may go three reads, but we are requesting the legislation change be passed as an emergency after one read.

Topic: Legislation to advertise for bids and to enter into contracts for Materials, Supplies, and Services to Various Departments/Divisions

History: This is the annual item of legislation that authorizes the bidding of various services or supplies that are necessary for the daily operation of the city government or our utilities. Generally items such as: chemicals; materials for the electric, water, sewer, or street operations; insurance; fuel; uniforms; and janitorial services, are some of the items identified in this legislation. These items are bid out throughout the year as may be needed.

Purchasing: All City Departments.

Financing: Each department has already budgeted for these expenses in their 2020 budget.

Recommendation: To maintain City operations, we request that this is passed on the first reading.

Topic: Resolution authorizing the City Manager to advertise for bids and construct a new "Carbon Feed Building and Equipment" to remove harmful algal from the raw water and provide safe drinking water to our customers.

History: The City of Painesville's Water Treatment plant was issued a Notice of Violation regarding the temporary powdered activated carbon (PAC) system in 2018, utilized to meet regulatory compliance for water quality standards, associated with harmful algal blooms. Ohio EPA required the City's Water Treatment facility to submit plans to install a new carbon feed facility to replace the temporary PAC feed system. The new detailed plans for the carbon feed system have been approved by OEPA and construction is planned for 2020.

Financing: The cost associated with this project is \$500,000.00 and is budgeted in the Water Budget under the Water Fund.

Recommendation: Staff recommends legislation is granted for the agreed upon "Carbon Feed Building and Equipment".

Topic: Property Tax Advances
